

**AN ACT REGULATING THE REGISTRATION, LICENSURE, AND PRACTICE OF  
PHYSICAL THERAPY, AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR**

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines  
in Congress Assembled:*

**ARTICLE I**

**TITLE AND DEFINITION OF TERMS**

3  
4       **SECTION 1. Short Title of Act.** This Act shall be known as the “Philippine Physical  
5 Therapy Law”.

6       **SEC. 2. Statement of Policy.** The State recognizes the importance of physical  
7 therapists in nation building. Hence, it shall develop and nurture competent, productive,  
8 and well-rounded physical therapists whose standards of practice and service shall be

1 excellent, and globally competitive, resulting not only from their education and training  
2 but through, honest, effective, and credible licensure examinations, regulatory measures,  
3 programs, and activities that foster their continuing professional growth.

4 **SEC. 3. Definition of Terms.** As used in this Act.

- 5 a. *Physical Therapy* refers to a health profession concerned with providing relevant  
6 services to individuals and populations to develop, maintain, and restore  
7 maximum movement and functional ability throughout the lifespan. Such  
8 services are provided in circumstances where movement and function are  
9 threatened by aging, injury, pain, diseases, disorders, conditions, or  
10 environmental factors, and with the understanding that functional movement is  
11 central to healthy and well-being. Physical therapy is also known as  
12 physiotherapy.
- 13 b. *Physical Therapist* refers to a person who is a holder of a valid registration and  
14 professional license issued by the Professional Regulatory Board of Physical  
15 Therapy and the Professional Regulation Commission, and who is legally  
16 qualified to practice physical therapy in the Philippines pursuant to this Act.

17 **SEC. 4. Scope and Nature of the Practice of Physical Therapy.** The practice  
18 of physical therapy shall include identifying and maximizing quality of life and movement  
19 potential within the spheres of promotion, prevention, treatment, intervention,  
20 habilitation, and rehabilitation. These spheres encompass physical, psychological,  
21 emotional, and social wellbeing. Physical therapists are qualified and professionally  
22 required to:

- 23 a. Undertake a comprehensive examination or assessment of a patient or client or  
24 needs of a client group;
- 25 b. Evaluate the findings from the examination or assessment to make clinical  
26 judgments regarding patients or clients;
- 27 c. Formulate a physical therapy diagnosis, prognosis, and plan;
- 28 d. Provide consultation within their expertise and determine when patients or clients  
29 need to be referred to another professional;
- 30 e. Implement a physical therapy intervention or treatment program;
- 31 f. Determine the outcomes of any interventions or treatments; and
- 32 g. Make recommendations for self-management.

33 The scope of physical therapy practice is not limited to direct patient or client care,  
34 but also includes: formulating and implementing responsive public health strategies;

1 advocating for patients' or clients' health; supervising and delegating to others; leading;  
2 managing; teaching; researching and developing and implementing health policy at the  
3 local, national, and international levels.

## 4 **ARTICLE II**

### 5 **THE PROFESSIONAL REGULATORY BOARD OF PHYSICAL THERAPY**

6 **SEC. 5. Creation and Composition of the Members of the Board.** There is  
7 hereby created a Professional Regulatory Board of Physical Therapy, hereafter referred  
8 to as the Board, under the administrative supervision of the Professional Regulation  
9 Commission (PRC), composed of a Chairperson and four (4) Members appointed by the  
10 President of the Philippines within six (6) months from the enactment of this Act and upon  
11 the recommendation of the PRC from among physical therapists recognized and  
12 nominated by the accredited integrated professional organization (AIPO) of physical  
13 therapists.

14 **SEC. 6. Powers and Functions of the Members of the Board.** The Board shall  
15 have the following powers and functions:

- 16 a. Promulgate, administer, and enforce rules and regulations necessary for  
17 carrying out the provisions of this Act;
- 18 b. Supervise and regulate the registration, licensure, and practice of physical  
19 therapy in the Philippines;
- 20 c. Administer oaths in connection with the administration of this Act;
- 21 d. Adopt an official seal of the Board;
- 22 e. Maintain a roster of physical therapists indicating therein the basic information  
23 about the registered professionals;
- 24 f. Issue, reinstate, suspend or cancel the registration and license, or special  
25 permits for the practice of physical therapy in the Philippines;
- 26 g. Study and monitor conditions affecting the practice of physical therapy and  
27 adopt such measures as may be deemed necessary for the enhancement of the  
28 profession and maintenance of high professional and ethical standards;
- 29 h. Work in partnership with the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) or its  
30 equivalent, to ensure that all educational institutions offering education comply  
31 with the prescribed policies, standards, and guidelines;
- 32 i. Prescribe the Code of Ethics and Ethical Standards of Practice for physical  
33 therapists as endorsed by the AIPO organization of physical therapists;

- 1 j. Hear or investigate any violations of this Act, its implementing rules and  
2 regulations, code of ethics, and ethical standards of practice, and for this  
3 purpose,
- 4 k. Issue *subpoena duces tecum* or *subpoena ad testificandum*, or both, to ensure  
5 the appearance of witnesses, and the production of documents in connection  
6 therewith: *Provided, That* the decision of the Board shall become final and  
7 executory after fifteen (15) days from receipt of judgment or decision unless  
8 appealed to the PRC;
- 9 l. Prescribe guidelines and criteria for the Continuing Professional Development  
10 (CPD) program for physical therapists;
- 11 m. Prescribe the subjects in the licensure examination and table specifications,  
12 determine the syllabi of the subjects and their relative weights, score, and rate  
13 the examination papers, and submit the results to the PRC within the period  
14 provided for in the rules of the PRC;
- 15 n. Administer the examinations to applicants for the practice of physical therapy in  
16 accordance with the provisions of this Act;
- 17 o. Adopt a program for the full computerization of the licensure examination;
- 18 p. Grant an application for registration without examination subject to the approval  
19 of the PRC;
- 20 q. Issue special permits to persons admitted to the practice of physical therapy for  
21 a specific duration of time, and certificates of recognition for advanced studies,  
22 researches, and accomplishments that contribute to the enrichment of the  
23 profession; and
- 24 r. Perform such other powers and functions as deemed necessary to carry out the  
25 objectives of this Act.

26 The policies, resolutions, rules and regulations, orders, or decisions issued or  
27 promulgated by the Board shall be subject to review and approval of the PRC.

28 **SEC. 7. Qualifications of the Members of the Board.** The members of the Board  
29 shall, at the time of their appointment, possess the following qualifications:

- 30 a. Has resided in the Philippines for at least (5) years;
- 31 b. Is a duly registered physical therapist under this Act, with a valid certificate of  
32 registration and professional license;
- 33 c. Has engaged in the practice of physical therapy for at least ten (10) years, with the  
34 last five (5) years as a continuous period immediately preceding the appointment;

- 1 d. Has demonstrated an exemplary degree of competence and ethics in one
- 2 professional practice as a physical therapist;
- 3 e. Is a member of good standing of the AIPO of physical therapists, and not an officer
- 4 thereof;
- 5 f. Has no prior conviction by a competent court of an offense involving moral
- 6 turpitude; and
- 7 g. Has no direct or indirect pecuniary interest in any school, college, or university or
- 8 institution conferring an academic degree for admission to the practice of physical
- 9 therapy; or where review classes in preparation for licensure examination are
- 10 offered or conducted; nor be a member of faculty or administration thereof.

11 **SEC 8. Term of Office.** The Chairperson and Members of the Board shall hold  
12 office for a term of three (3) years: *Provided*, That members of the first Board to be  
13 appointed after the approval of this Act shall hold office for the following terms: the  
14 Chairperson for three (3) years, two (2) Members for two (2) years, and the other two (2)  
15 Members for one (1) year; *Provided*, Further, that a Chairperson or Member may be  
16 appointed for a second term, but may not serve more than two consecutive three year  
17 terms, or six (6) consecutive years. Interim vacancies be filled for the unexpired term  
18 only, or until their successors have been appointed and duly qualified.

19 **SEC 9. Removal of the Members of the Board.** Any member of the Board may  
20 upon the recommendation of the PRC after due process of law and investigation, be  
21 suspended or removed by the President from office for cause such as gross neglect of  
22 duty, incompetence, malpractice, unprofessionalism, immorality, unethical or  
23 dishonorable conduct, final judgment of crimes involving moral turpitude, manipulation  
24 of the licensure examination results, disclosure of secret and confidential information in  
25 the examination questions prior to the conduct of the said examination, or tampering of  
26 grades.

27 **SEC 10. Compensation and Allowances of the Members of the Board.** The  
28 Chairperson and Members of the Board shall receive compensation and allowances  
29 comparable to that being received by the Chairpersons and Members of existing  
30 regulatory boards under the PRC, as provided for in the annual General Appropriations  
31 Act.





1           **SEC. 16. Ratings in the Examination.** To be qualified as having passed the  
2 licensure examination for physical therapists, a candidate must have obtained a general  
3 average of seventy-five percent (75%), with no grade lower than sixty percent (60%) in  
4 any of the examination subjects.

5           **SEC 17. Report of Ratings.** The Board shall submit to the PRC the ratings  
6 obtained by each candidate within ten (10) calendar days after the examination, unless  
7 extended for just cause.

8           **SEC 18. Issuance of the Certificate of Registration, Professional License, and**  
9 **Professional Identification Card.** The certificate of registration and professional  
10 identification card shall be issued to examinees who passed the licensure examination  
11 for physical therapist subject to payment of fees prescribed by the PRC. The certificate  
12 of registration shall bear the signature of the Chairperson of the PRC and the  
13 Chairperson and Members of the Board, stamped with the official seals of the PRC and  
14 the Board respectively, indicating that the person named therein is entitled to practice  
15 the physical therapy profession, with all the benefits and privileges appurtenant thereto.  
16 The certificate of registration shall remain in full force and effect until revoked or  
17 suspended in accordance with this Act.

18           The professional identification card bearing the registration number, and dates of  
19 issuance and expiry duly signed by the Chairperson of the PRC shall likewise be issued  
20 to every registrant upon payment of the required fees. The professional identification card  
21 shall be renewed every three (3) years, upon compliance with the Continuing  
22 Professional Development (CPD), and submission of a certificate of good standing from  
23 the AIPO, and other requirements of the Board and the PRC.

24           **SEC 19. Initials PTRP.** The initials PTRP, which stands for Physical Therapist  
25 Registered Philippines, shall be used following the name of the registered physical  
26 therapist, especially when signing documents pertinent to the practice of the profession.

27           **SEC. 20. Refusal to Register.** The Board shall refuse to register any successful  
28 examinee who has been convicted by a court of competent jurisdiction of any criminal  
29 offense involving moral turpitude, or has been found guilty of immoral or dishonorable  
30 conduct after investigation by the Board, or has been declared to be of unsound mind.  
31 The reason for the refusal shall be set forth in writing.

32           **SEC. 21. Cancellation or Suspension of the Certificate of Registration and**  
33 **Special Permit.** The Board may, after giving proper notice of hearing to the party  
34 concerned, cancel the practitioner's certificate of registration and professional

1 identification card , or be suspended from the practice of the profession; or cancel the  
2 special permit for any of the causes or grounds mentioned in Section 29 of this Act or for  
3 any unprofessional or unethical conduct, malpractice, violation of any of the provisions of  
4 this Act, its rules and regulations, the Code of Ethics, and Ethical Standards of Practice  
5 for physical therapists.

6 **SEC. 22. Reinstatement, Re-issuance or Replacement of Certificate of**  
7 **Registration and Professional Identification Card.** Two (2) years after the date of  
8 revocation, the Board may, upon application and for reasons deemed proper and  
9 sufficient, reinstate any revoked certificate of registration or professional license. A new  
10 certificate of registration or professional identification card, or special temporary permit  
11 may be issued to replace lost, destroyed, or mutilated ones, subject to the rules as  
12 implemented by the Board.

13 **SEC 23. Oath of Physical Therapists.** Successful examinees qualified for  
14 registration, and qualified applicants for registration without examination, shall be  
15 required to take an oath of profession before any member of the Board or any government  
16 official authorized by the PRC to administer oaths, prior to entering into the practice of  
17 physical therapy in the Philippines.

18 **SEC 24. Indication of Licensure and Privilege Tax Receipt.** All physical  
19 therapists shall be required to indicate on the documents they sign, use or issue in  
20 connection with the practice of their profession, their registration, or professional license  
21 number and date of issuance thereof, the duration of validity of said license, and the  
22 privilege tax receipt number issued to them.

23 **SEC 25. Roster of Physical Therapists.** The Board shall prepare, update, and  
24 maintain a roster of physical therapists which shall contain the name of each registered  
25 physical therapist, their residence and office addresses, the date of registration and  
26 issuance of certificates, and other data which the board may deem pertinent.

27 **SEC 26. Issuance of Special and Temporary Permit.** A special temporary permit  
28 may be issued by the Board upon the recommendation of the AIPO of physical therapists,  
29 subject to the approval by the PRC and payment of the prescribed fee to the following  
30 persons:

- 31 a. Foreign-licensed physical therapists called for consultation or a specified  
32 purpose that is deemed essential to national development, the practice shall be  
33 limited only for the particular work being: *Provided* That there is no Filipino  
34 physical therapist qualified for such consultation or purpose;

- b. Foreign-licensed physical therapists whose service shall be free of charge and who are highly needed under particular settings;
- c. Foreign-licensed physical therapists engaged as professors, lecturers, or critics in fields essential to physical therapy education in the Philippines, whose engagement is limited to teaching only; and
- d. Foreign-licensed physical therapists recognized as experts or specialists whose service is deemed essential to the advancement of the profession in the Philippines.

The special temporary permit shall include these limitations and conditions: validity for a period of not more than one (1) year, subject to renewal; the branch or specialty of physical therapy which the permit holder can practice; and the specific place or places of practice such as clinic, hospital, therapy center, school, college, or university offering the course of physical therapy. The Board, subject to the approval by the PRC, shall prescribe rules and regulations for the implementation of this particular section.

#### **ARTICLE IV**

#### **PRACTICE OF PHYSICAL THERAPY**

**SEC. 27. Delivery of Physical Therapy Service.** Physical therapists shall work in partnership with other health service providers or health professionals, patients or clients, families, and communities in the delivery of services in the most effective, cost efficient, and client-centered service.

**SEC. 28. Prohibition on the Practice of Physical Therapy.** No person shall practice or offer to practice physical therapy, nor offer to be a physical therapist, or use the title, word, letter, figure, or any sign tending to convey the impression of being a physical therapist, nor advertise or indicate in any manner whatsoever to be qualified to perform the work of a physical therapist without passing the licensure examination given by the Board, except as otherwise provided in this Act.

**SEC. 29. Prohibited Acts.** No person shall:

- a. Engage in the practice of physical therapy by representing oneself as a physical therapist without a valid certificate of registration, professional identification card, or a valid temporary or special permit granted by the Board pursuant to this Act;
- b. Represent oneself as a physical therapist during the time that the professional license is not valid or that the certificate of registration has been

1 suspended or revoked, or that the special temporary permit has been  
2 cancelled;

3 c. Allow anybody to use the certificate of registration or professional license, or  
4 both and special temporary permit as a physical therapist to enable such  
5 unqualified individual to engage in the practice of physical therapy;

6 d. Use the certificate of registration, professional identification card, or special  
7 temporary permit of another person; and

8 e. Violate the provision of the Code of Ethics and Ethical Standards of Practice  
9 as recommended by the AIPO of physical therapists.

10 **SEC. 30. Code of Ethics and Standards of Practice for Physical Therapists.**

11 The Board shall adopt and promulgate the Code of Ethics and Ethical Standards of  
12 Practice for physical therapists as prescribed and issued by the AIPO of physical  
13 therapists. All licensed physical therapist shall abide by the principles and standards  
14 embodied in the Code.

15 **SEC. 31. Continuing Professional Development Program.** All physical therapists  
16 shall abide with the requirements, rules and regulations on continuing professional  
17 development to be promulgated by the Professional Regulatory Board of Physical  
18 Therapy, subject to the approval of the PRC, in coordination with the AIPO of physical  
19 therapists or the recognized representative of duly accredited education institutions, or  
20 both. For this purpose, the Board shall create a CPD Council to implement a CPD  
21 program guided by qualifications framework and career progression principles, subject to  
22 the guidelines as may be prescribed by the PRC.

23 **SEC. 32. Integration of the Professional Organization.** The physical therapy  
24 profession shall be integrated into one (1) national professional organization of physical  
25 therapists, which shall be duly registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission.  
26 The Board, subject to the approval by the PRC, shall accredit the said organization as  
27 the one and only accredited integrated professional organization of registered physical  
28 therapists. All physical therapists whose names appear in the current Roster of Physical  
29 Therapists shall *ipso facto* become members thereof and shall receive all the benefits  
30 and privileges appurtenant thereto upon payment of the required membership fees and  
31 dues. Membership in the accredited integrated professional organization shall not be a  
32 bar to membership in other organizations of physical therapists.

33 **SEC. 33. Foreign Reciprocity.** No foreign physical therapist shall be given a  
34 certificate of registration and professional identification card or be entitled to any of the

1 privileges under this Act unless the country or state of which the foreign physical therapist  
2 is a subject or citizen, permits Filipino physical therapists to practice within its territorial  
3 limits on the same basis as the subjects or citizens of said country or state.

#### 4 **ARTICLE V**

#### 5 **PENAL AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS**

6 **SEC. 34. Penal Provisions.** Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of  
7 this Act or any of its implementing rules and regulations as promulgated by the Board,  
8 subject to the approval of the PRC, shall upon conviction, be punished with a fine of not  
9 less than Twenty thousand pesos (Php 20,000.00) nor more than Fifty thousand pesos  
10 (Php 50,000.00), or by imprisonment of not less than two years nor more than five years,  
11 or both, at the discretion of the court.

12 **SEC. 35. Appropriations.** The Chairperson of the PRC shall immediately include  
13 in the Commission's program, the implementation of this Act, the funding of which shall  
14 be included in the annual General Appropriations Act.

15 **SEC. 36. Implementing Rules and Regulations.** To implement the provisions of  
16 this Act, the Board shall, subject to the approval of the PRC, promulgate the rules and  
17 regulations, as well as the Code of Ethics and Ethical Standards of Practice for physical  
18 therapists, within sixty (60) days after the effectivity of this Act.

19 **SEC. 37. Transitory Provisions.** The existing Board of Physical and Occupational  
20 Therapy shall continue to function in the interim until such time that the new and separate  
21 Board for Physical Therapy shall be constituted pursuant to this Act.

22 **SEC. 38. Separability Clause.** If any part, portion, section, or provision of this Act  
23 shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional, such shall not invalidate any other part,  
24 portion, section, or provision of this Act and the same shall continue to be in force and  
25 effect.

26 **SEC 39. Repealing Clause.** Republic Act No. 5680, otherwise known as the  
27 "Philippine Physical and Occupational Therapy Law" is hereby repealed. All other laws,  
28 decrees, orders, issuances or parts thereof which are inconsistent with the provisions of  
29 this Act are hereby modified, superseded, or repealed.

30 **SEC 40. Effectivity.** This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication  
31 in the *Official Gazette* or in a newspaper of general circulation.

### OBJECTIVES:

- To promote the development of globally-competitive, highly-motivated, and well-trained Filipino physical therapists by instituting standards for the practice of profession, including those for licensure, registration and continuing education.

### KEY PROVISIONS:

- Creates the Professional Regulatory Board of Physical Therapy to provide for a more effective supervision, control and regulation of the practice of physical therapy in the country;
- Requires the licensure of physical therapists in the Philippines and sets the scope and limitations for the licensure examination;
- Proposes the adoption and promulgation of a Code of Ethics and Ethical Standards of Practice for physical therapists;
- Requires physical therapists to undertake the Continuing Professional Development Program for Physical Therapists in the Philippines;
- Proposes the integration of all physical therapists in the country into one (1) accredited and integrated professional organization (AIPO), duly registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) and recognized by the Board of Physical Therapy and the Professional Regulations Commission (PRC);
- Sets the conditions for allowing foreign physical therapists to practice the profession in the Philippines; and
- Penalizes violations of this Act.
