AN ACT
ESTABLISHING A TECHNICAL EDUCATION AND SKILLS DEVELOPMENT
AUTHORITY (TESDA) TRAINING AND ASSESSMENT CENTER IN THE
MUNICIPALITY OF BANTAY, PROVINCE OF ILOCOS SUR, TO BE KNOWN AS
THE BANTAY, ILOCOS SUR TESDA TRAINING AND ASSESSMENT CENTER, AND
APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

1 **SECTION 1. *Short Title.*** - This Act shall be known as the “*Bantay, Ilocos Sur TESDA*
2 *Training and Assessment Center Act*”.

3
4 **SEC. 2. *Establishment.*** - There is hereby established a Technical Education and Skills
5 Development Authority (TESDA) training and assessment center in the Municipality of Bantay,
6 Province of Ilocos Sur, under the supervision of the TESDA, to be known as the Bantay, Ilocos
7 Sur TESDA Training and Assessment Center. It shall be established in a highly accessible
8 location in the Municipality of Bantay, pursuant to the purposes of this Act and to the agreement
9 of the TESDA and the concerned local government units (LGUs).

10
11 **SEC. 3. *General Mandate.*** – The Bantay, Ilocos Sur TESDA Training and Assessment
12 Center, hereinafter referred to as the Center, shall primarily provide technical-vocational
13 education and training (TVET) programs to students, local residents from low-income families,
14 and out-of-school youths, including persons with disabilities and indigenous peoples, in the
15 Municipality of Bantay, and the neighboring localities in the Province of Ilocos Sur, to help them
16 become productive, self-reliant and globally competitive labor assets.

17
18 The Center shall provide effective employment interventions through training programs
19 on relevant skills in trade competencies, craftsmanship, and entrepreneurship to help hasten the
20 development of the host area and the adjacent localities in the Province of Ilocos Sur into human
21 resource and productivity hubs.

1 The Center shall serve as a TESDA-accredited Assessment Center for acquired
2 competencies in TVET programs in the Municipality of Bantay and adjacent localities in the
3 Province of Ilocos Sur. It shall also provide teachers' training and curriculum design assistance
4 to the secondary schools offering the technical-vocational livelihood track under the K to 12
5 Program in coordination with the Department of Education and the TESDA.
6

7 **SEC. 4. Training Programs** – The Center shall offer short-term certificate courses and
8 modular trainings in preferred technical-vocational skills and trades specialization. To this end,
9 the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE), Department of Trade and Industry (DTI),
10 Department of Science and Technology (DOST), Department of Agriculture (DA), Department
11 of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), National Economic and Development Authority
12 (NEDA), business-industry partners, and other relevant agencies and instrumentalities, both
13 local and international, shall provide the necessary assistance to enable the Center to develop
14 skilled manpower to achieve a robust and inclusive economy in the host area and its adjacent
15 localities.
16

17 The Center may establish research and technology hubs, technology development farms,
18 satellite or extension training centers, promote mobile training programs, and strengthen linkages
19 with industry partners and the academe in order to better provide the residents of the
20 Municipality of Bantay and the neighboring localities in the Province of Ilocos Sur with practical
21 livelihood, employable skills, gainful employment, and entrepreneurial capabilities.
22

23 The Center shall offer the following TVET programs with competencies assessment
24 leading to National Certification Levels I-III:
25

- 26 (a) Skills training in industrial technology and hard trades such as metal and steelwork,
27 machine fabrication and operation, heavy equipment operation, automotive
28 mechanical assembly, refrigeration and air conditioning, electronics, and operation of
29 power tools and equipment for both medium skills grade and industrial purposes;
30
- 31 (b) Agriculture and aquaculture-related trainings and skills development in such areas as
32 farming technology, fishing operations technology, backyard farming and home-
33 based aquaculture and propagation innovations, mechanized farming, fishing tools
34 and equipment operation, agribusiness, agri-aqua trade technology and innovations,
35 and relevant farmers and fisherfolk's trainings for increased productivity and
36 entrepreneurship;

- 38 (c) Livelihood skills development courses for preferred skills employment and small-
39 scale entrepreneurship, including practical skills education in arts and crafts,
40 workmanship and design, high-speed sewing, dressmaking and tailoring, horticulture,
41 livestock raising and breeding, food processing technology, home technology,
42 culinary arts and commercial cooking, cosmetology, and health and wellness training;
43
- 44 (d) Basic business literacy training in financial management, marketing, practical

1 accountancy, bookkeeping, office procedures, business processes and application
2 procedures, including registration, licensing, documentation, business patent and
3 intellectual property regulation, business financing and investment opportunities
4 sourcing, import-export accreditation, online home-based business operation, and
5 social media business marketing;
6

7 (e) Technical-vocational occupation and trades skills such as carpentry, masonry,
8 plumbing, welding, practical electricity and installation, automotive servicing,
9 electronics servicing, personal computer servicing, and such other relevant practical
10 skills courses;

11
12 (f) Computer literacy and information technology-related skills, digital technology,
13 web design, animation, photoshop/online photography, computer design, and
14 advertising;

15
16 (g) Social communication skills and language proficiency courses in English and other
17 languages for business process outsourcing employment and overseas job placement;

18
19 (h) Seminars on personality development, career counseling and job placement, and work
20 ethic and values; and

21
22 (i) Other preferred skills and trades training that may be needed by the people of the
23 Municipality of Bantay and adjacent localities of the Province of Ilocos Sur to
24 enhance their capacities for practical livelihood, gainful employment, and
25 entrepreneurial activities.
26

27 **SEC. 5. *Compliance with TESDA Requirements.***- The provisions of this Act
28 notwithstanding, the Center shall become operational only upon the determination and
29 certification by the TESDA, through the issuance of a formal recommendation and certificate of
30 compliance, that the Center has satisfactorily complied with the minimum standards of quality
31 prescribed by the TESDA governing the following: a) standard procedures and guidelines for the
32 establishment and operation of a Center; b) operational sustainability of the Center, in terms of
33 licensed faculty-trainers and personnel, equipment, training and laboratory facilities,
34 instructional materials, and other standard requirements of a Center; c) sustainable funding
35 source and allocation of the budgetary requirement; d) full alignment of the training programs
36 offered with the minimum standards of competency-based quality technical-vocational skills
37 technology and the needs of the host area and adjacent communities served within the context of
38 Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) integration and the Philippine Qualifications
39 Framework for TVET; and e) compliance with such other TESDA conditionalities and standards,
40 as may be necessary and applicable in establishing a Center.
41

42 **SEC. 6. *Administration.*** – The Center shall be headed by a Technical-Vocational
43 Administrator who shall be under the supervision of the TESDA, render full-time service, and be
44 responsible for its administration and operation.
45

1 The Technical-Vocational Administrator shall be appointed by the TESDA Director
2 General in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Civil Service Commission and the
3 qualification requirements for such office.

4 The Technical-Vocational Administrator shall enter into agreements with locally-based
5 private and public counterpart agencies or instrumentalities and persons, subject to the approval
6 of the TESDA Director General, for such assistance as may be necessary to effectively
7 implement this Act.
8

9 **SEC. 7. Appropriations.** - The Director General of the TESDA shall include in the
10 Authority's program the operation of the Center, the funding of which shall be included in the
11 annual General Appropriations Act.
12

13 The LGUs concerned, in consultation with the TESDA, shall set aside from any available
14 local revenue an amount deemed appropriate as annual counterpart fund to support the operation
15 of the Center herein established.
16

17 **SEC. 8. Implementing Rules and Regulations.** - Within ninety (90) days after the
18 approval of this Act, the TESDA shall, in coordination with the DOLE, DTI, DOST, DA,
19 Department of Budget and Management, DILG, NEDA, concerned LGUs, and such other
20 relevant agencies and industry-business partners of the host locality, prepare and issue the
21 necessary rules and regulations for the effective implementation of this Act.
22

23 **SEC. 9. Separability Clause.** - If, for any reason, any section or provision of this Act
24 shall be deemed unconstitutional or invalid, the other sections or provisions hereof shall not be
25 affected and shall remain in force and effect.
26

27 **SEC. 10. Repealing Clause.** - All laws, executive orders, decrees, instructions, rules and
28 regulations contrary to or inconsistent with any provision of this Act are repealed or amended
29 accordingly.
30

31 **SEC. 11. Effectivity.** - This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in
32 the *Official Gazette* or in a newspaper of general circulation.
33
